

The kids of course loved the adventure. The next four weeks continued to bring more and more snow, and our final tally before mid-February was about ten FEET of snow! While we continue to cherish and nurture the "spirit" of the Glen, we know that the facilities that support this spirit need attention as well. Reflect on the impact this physical and spirit-filled environment had, or is having, on you, your children or your grandchildren, and then decide to support its next 85 years so that it remains a vital part of summer for future generations of leaders. A warm, enthusiastic "Thank you" to all our GG Donors! As we have said so many times before, Geneva Glen is a non-profit camp and we rely on your donations to fund GG Camperships, facility maintenance and capital improvements, and the GG endowment. We also rely on in-kind donations, supplies and labor to help with projects around camp. There are projects of all shapes and sizes. For example:

In-Kind donation - John McHugh, (former camper and now father of three campers.) John's company US Mix was able to donate 60 bags of Masonry Cement, 168 bags of All Purpose Sand and 90 each 8" x 8" x 16" block. These supplies were worth \$1300. They were able to help with construction jobs around camp.

Monetary Donation – Drs. Barry and Carol Rumack, (camper parents and now camper grandparents) provided funding in full for the new Health Center, "Place of the Healing Feather." Geneva Glen gratefully acknowledges the generosity of the Rumack family, for making the Rumack R&R our camp's haven of health and regeneration. Our new Health Center was designed by our current nurse, camp doctors, former nurses and other individuals forming a "design team" that envisioned a health center specific to Geneva Glen. Besides the main lodge and the caretaker's apartment, this building is fully winterized.

The following four major projects have been identified as substantial needs for camp's future. The Chapel project is nearing its completion with the fourth and final phase scheduled for the 2007/2008 off season.

Marathon Lodge

Built in 1919 by the "Marathon Adult Sunday School" from Denver's Central Presbyterian Church, Marathon is showing its age. Marathon is a critical multi-purpose building housing several program areas and serving as an alternative to the main lodge.

Need: A new building on the same site with added space and functionality would enhance camp's program on several levels.

This could be a candidate for group or family funding.

Pool Renovation/Reconstruction

Geneva Glen built the swimming pool in 1962 to eliminate bussing campers to "Progress Plunge" in Denver or Soda Lakes in Morrison. For an outdoor swimming pool, it has exceeded its expected life! Time, winter and intense summer use have taken a major toll on the mechanics, structure and safety elements of our pool, and repair and renovation costs are expected to soar.

Need: To build a new pool in compliance with current health and safety standards and designed to withstand climate and program requirements.

Trail Reconstruction and Environmental Management

Over the years, Geneva Glen has become an oasis within a housing neighborhood. Eighty percent of the property boundary is adjacent to private home lots. Its' 480 acres of forested vertical terrain make for rugged topography, to say the least. Hiking and horseback riding trails are steep and severely eroded. Hospitable flat space for camping is rare. Support and emergency access is limited.

Geneva Glen has traditionally been a good steward of its environment, but development pressures and the increased impact of camp programs create a need to bring our environment into better balance, reducing fire danger, allowing for better wildlife management,

Barn Renovation/Reconstruction

Ever since 1949, when Geneva Glen purchased the entire 23 horse "Byers Peak Ranch" string including saddles, tack and supplies for the whopping sum of \$500, the horseback riding program has been an integral part of camp's daily activities. As Indian Hills has grown and camp's property has become more contained, all horse trails and rides are inside camp's boundary and confined to eroded trails and vertical terrain.

Need: To bring the barn facilities up to date to allow for expanding the educational component of our horseback program, giving us facilities to continue breeding and humanely caring for our horses.
