Greetings from the Directors **Happy Autumn campers!**

The values our staff wished to emulate were re-appraised each session and the channels for inspiration were highlighted. Feathers were presented all summer as symbols of inspiration in deeds, and in acts that promoted this theme and raised the standard of care and behavior.

September in the Rockies is always a treat. A bit of rain to keep the dust down sifts through that glorious Colorado sunshine and temperatures around 75 most days, helping us gloat to our sweltering Texas friends!

It was an unusual summer for weather. A small wildfire broke out at the base of our mountain in Indian Hills a week before staff training. Having prayed our way through many former dry summers, we were immensely grateful for a heavy, wet snow 24 hours later. As the summer proceeded normally, rare thunderstorms doused our early fears for forest fires but kept us alert for lightning strikes. The routine for thunder heard at the pool is "everyone out of the pool" for 45 minutes, even if no lightning is seen. That same agenda is followed pretty much at ropes and barn. Lightning, of course, may spook a horse, but a drizzly rain, though no fun on a wet steed, is far preferable to a lightning show!

Our Myths & Magic session remained fairly didn't normal; dampen any of the main activities. and 165 ragamuffins romped through crafts, barn,







World Friendship is ever the serendipity session – as fresh ideas seem to bloom for this most untraditional of weeks. Now don't get us wrong, yes, we still have the Peace Prize. The winners bask in deserved glory on our final ceremony Friday night. This summer, **Kathryn Yetter**, of St. Paul, MN, and **Emily Lederer** of Denver both long-time veterans (and pacifists!) were awarded that coveted prize. The ultimate Sportsmanship award went to **Atzin Baltazar**,

Brodie Wiener. The and candlelight ceremony, peace pole, the Chautauqua sevencourse progressive repast, and Olympic rivalry dominate most of our late summer session. However, WF is an opportunity for kookie contests! Pete Mahan wanted to try "Aqua Archery" (he knows Nancy's penchant for alliteration), so balloons were



floating in the pool (no campers that we know of!), and arrows were twanged to puncture them. It was more difficult than it sounds, but lots of fun! The cross-country race took on added importance as 80% of the camp participated, even the junior girls of Narnia made it through the grueling foothill path showing up the furry footed Hobbits of the Shire (junior boys!)

At the 2011 National American Camp Association Conference we attended, the emphasis was on free play. It truly impressed us. We could proudly state that camp encourages free play in a variety of aspects for campers, but we decided to expand it for staff as well. During orientation, the counseling staff was given five areas to "play" in: the stream bed (including mud); sand pile; musical instruments; colored sidewalk chalk art; fort building. It was an unbridled

success as these college kids dove in with abandon and became "pure kids" ... again. We highly recommend it!

Some of the benefits for free play are that kids get to make their own rules, settle their own arguments, create cooperative scenarios, and moderate their own behavior.

A new favorite evening activity, Jurassic Park, ranked up there with Capture the Flag (see Huck's description of this game!). Two British leaders, Nelli Morton, and Dave Stewart, gave us plenty of fodder for jibes as we taunted them good naturedly about their proper pronunciation. The song "One Bottle of Pop," became "One Fizzy Drink..." Dave brought a Human Clue game from his Manchester background, for a Mystery evening play during World Friendship. It was



a ripping success! To solve the mystery, campers interrogated Russian spies, ghoulish butlers, and headless ghosts which produced sparse evidence. Each station had its formidable task and campers ran helter-skelter from one end of camp to the other. We will certainly bring this evening blast of fun back for 2012.



GG Free-Session Lottery!



Interested in the Trainee Program?



How does the trainee program work?? A trainee is a camper selected for a leadership role, and who attends all five sessions of the summer. We generally choose between 8-10 campers to participate in this program, and it's an honor to be accepted. Trainees are able to enjoy the fun of being a camper, with some of the similar responsibilities that come with being a staff member. It's a terrific way to open the door to a staff career at Geneva Glen.

There is a high expectation of the trainee's leadership abilities and loyalties to the values they've learned through our teen programs. At Geneva Glen, a camper who will be 16 in the summer may apply for trainee. Keep in mind that it is a full summer commitment — which will be June 10 through August 11, 2012. The camper requests a special trainee application form.

If you are interested in applying for a trainee position, simply call or email the camp (the camper should correspond, NOT the parent!), or send a postcard requesting an application. Trainee applications will be available by mid-December.

NOTE: even if you apply for the Trainee program, you still need to send in your regular camper registration card (as soon as possible), starting in early November, for the camp session(s) of your choice.

Seeding the Future...

As we approach our 90th birthday celebration next Labor Day weekend, our fundraising efforts will be focused on the renovation and expansion of Marathon Lodge. The very first structure at the Glen we call Geneva was Marathon — started in 1919, built by the Marathon Adult Sunday School class at Central Presbyterian Church in Denver. The original tract of land was donated by George Olinger, great-great-grandfather of Michael Horan (2011 crew member)! Camp will reap countless benefits from the improvement of this important building. Be on the lookout for more details throughout the year, and thank you in advance for your support!

The expansion will have a daily impact on the lives of GG campers and staff, providing considerably more social space and "rainy-day" activity areas. The versatile building is currently home to the shield shop, archery hut, candy store and the most recent addition, camp's radio station, KGLN, 88.3 FM The Gleam. The newly renovated Marathon will be about twice the size, using old stonework from the original, able to chamber most of the camp family for rainy-day activities! As with most things at camp, the old will be nicely blended into the new!
